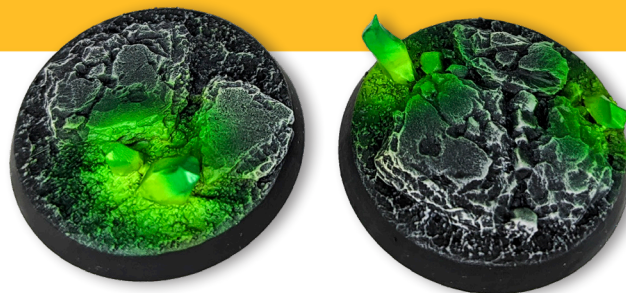

## Necron bases

This guide shows how to create and paint a Necron base step-by-step for our Necron miniatures or alien planets.

1 First, the Necron small monoliths or "crystals" are prepared. They can be carefully carved from pieces of sprue with a modeling knife.



2 We can also use other materials, such as plasticard sheets, which can also be carved to shape easily.



3 The bases are prepared by adding rocks of different sizes and shapes. For this you can use plastic/resin rocks, cork pieces, or small stones.



4 The Necron crystals created in the previous steps are glued to the base.



5 To simulate an asphalt effect, Black Lava-Asphalt 26.214 is applied to the bases.



6 Before starting the painting process, the bases are primed using Surface Primer Black 70.602 if using airbrush, or Hobby Paint Spray Black 28.012 if you want to use a spray can.



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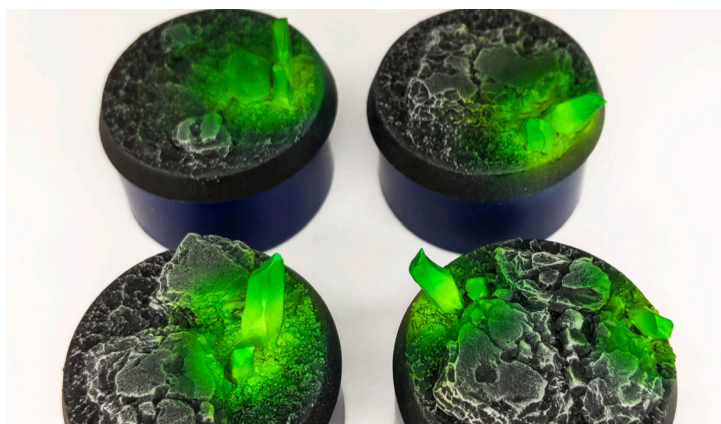
7 The base is quickly dry brushed with Game Color Cold Grey 72.050.



8 Using an airbrush, Game Air Dead White 72.701 is applied to and around the crystals.



9 A mixture of Game Ink Yellow Ink 72.085 and Game Ink Green Ink 72.089 is made at a ratio of 2 parts of yellow ink to 1 part of green ink. This will be the brightest highlight and is applied to the crystals and their surroundings, leaving the tips of the crystals blank.



10 To finish Green Game Ink 72.089 is applied to the ends of the crystals and around them using an airbrush, in order to achieve a darker green.



11 To finish the Necron bases, the edge is painted with Model Color Black 70.950.
